EASTER ~ Joy and Hope for the World

We hope you all had a wonderful Easter celebration and holiday. We believe that the Passion and Resurrection of Jesus are pivotal to our faith, the reason we call ourselves Christians so we need time, like the disciples to reflect upon what this means for us. What actually happened on that first Easter Day?

No doubt, if we had been alive in Jesus' time we, too, would have been astonished by the miracle of a resurrected corpse. There were times through Jesus life where he raised people from the dead, like Lazarus. So, how was their resurrection different to Jesus'? Pope Benedict XV1 tells us that, "Jesus' resurrection was about breaking out into an entirely new form of life, into a life that is no longer subject to the laws of dying and becoming, but lies beyond it – a life that opens up a new dimension of human existence. Jesus has not returned to a normal human life in this world like Lazarus. He has entered upon a different life, he has entered the vast breadth of God himself, and it is from there that he reveals himself to his followers".

Jesus disciples were quite used to Jesus performing the unusual: restoring sight to the blind; restoring mobility to the crippled; curing lepers of their disease. But now they had to grapple with a new understanding of Jesus, and we are given many examples where he was present to his disciples and they were able to recognise him without doubt, although Thomas required a bit more proof.

Another aspect of the Easter mysteries is the presence of the risen Christ beyond the time of his human journey. The Resurrection is not a past event that we merely commemorate. It is part of our lives today, part of the life of the Church since the days of the community that was formed around Jesus of Nazareth, continuing, and building up in love as we experience the Resurrection whenever we bond with those we love because they are gifts of God.

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From the Classroom - Year 4



Integrated Studies

Throughout Term 1, the Year 4 students have been learning about the diversity of experiences of Aboriginal peoples in Australia prior to 1788 and the importance of the environment and sustainable management of resources in two South Australian Aboriginal groups. They have been creating presentations that represent their knowledge and understandings around these areas.

Mathematics

The students have been learning about the properties of odd and even numbers, place value, area and perimeter, 2D shape, chance and probability and multiplication and division with arrays. This learning has been supported using concrete materials to help build understanding and support the development of knowledge and skills in these areas.

English

This term we have been engaging with the mentor text James and The Giant Peach written by Roald Dahl. The students have constructed recount texts that narrate what has happened in their school holidays, on the weekend and the story so far in their mentor text. They have also been given opportunities to write a persuasive text and learnt about the parts of speech needed to write a convincing argument within this task. The students work on their handwriting, reading, spelling and word knowledge daily during the morning literacy block and take part in a spelling test fortnightly.

Religious Education

In Week 9, the Year 4 students held a Mass. Given the time of the year, their focus was Lent- A Time to Grow in the Image of God. The students have learnt the Lent is a special time to grow and change and to reflect on their choices, to think about others and to be the best person they can be. In the classroom, we have been learning about gratitude through identifying what they are grateful for, how they can show God they are grateful and how they can show others they are grateful.

Performing Arts

Throughout Term 1, the Year 4 students have engaged in Footsteps. This is a dance programme where the students learn choreography to multiple dances including one for Sports Day which is coming up in Term 2.

Health

We have been learning about the concepts of Mindfulness, Bucket Filling and the Catastrophe Scale to help us build resilience, social and problem-solving skills and emotional regulation strategies.

Science

In Science, the students have been learning about the Earth's surface and how it changes over time through processes such as erosion, weathering, and deposition. The students have investigated why rivers curve, how different landforms such as beaches and mountains are shaped, and the impact humans and other animals have on the world around us.





Catholic School Swimming Carnival



On Thursday, 30th March, 13 students represented our school at the SA Aquatics Centre in Marion to compete in the Section 5 Catholic Schools Swimming Carnival. Students had been selected from School Swimming Trials and had also trained after school for their events.

The Year 6 swimmers were Jace MaCauley, Bridget Farmer and Charlie Ireland. The Year 5 swimmers were Leo Sobels, Jack McCauley and Kailem O'Hara. The Year 4 swimmers were Amelia Schutz-Wellington, Aaron Abeynayake and Chloe Millan. Max Sobels, Isabelle Farmer, Alessandra Jarvis and Amelia Farmer represented the Year 3 swimmers.

All our students competed to the best of their abilities and enjoyed the opportunity to swim in the state-of -the-art pool under race conditions.
