New Transport Option for 2025

Dear Parents and Guardians,

Beginning in 2025, we are pleased to offer a new transport option to support families with daily to and from school travel needs from Murray Bridge to Mount Barker. This service will provide:

- Transportation for students travelling between St. Francis de Sales College, in Mount Barker and St. Joseph's School at the beginning and end of the school day e.g. The approximate leave time from St Joseph's School is 8 am.
- · A pick-up service from Callington to Murray Bridge for St. Joseph's School students at approximately 8.45 am. There will be only one stop.

Initially, the service will utilise a large-seater vehicle, with plans to transition to a dedicated St. Joseph's School bus as demand grows.

Times have changed dramatically since many of us attended school. Today, televisions are used in most classrooms, computers are used daily, and tools like Seesaw and Facebook are used to communicate with parents. The same can be said about report cards; they have changed from the A-E grades we received when we were in school.

When I was in school, receiving a "C" was seen as a negative thing, but this is no longer the case. A "C" now means your child is achieving at the expected curriculum level. It takes a great deal of effort to reach this level. A "C" is something that should be celebrated, as it means your child is achieving exactly what they should be!

Your child's teachers have completed assessments for Semester Two, and the overall grade on the report is the combined grade for the whole school year. These reports will indicate how your child is progressing on their learning journey. Classroom teachers devote hours to observing, collating data, and ensuring the report accurately reflects how your child is achieving at this point in time in their learning. If you need assistance accessing the SEQTA report, please call the administration office of the school and Mr Luke Woods will be able to assist you.



BALANCING TURMOIL AND PEACE

One of the most popular activities of the Advent and Christmas seasons is the singing of carols. We have "carols by Candlelight", "Carols in the Park", "Carols in the classrooms" and all express happiness and joy. However, not all carols were composed in happy or joyful circumstances and the "Twelve Days of Christmas" was one such carol. When Henry V111 had his falling out with Pope Clement V11, he set about to dismantle the Catholic Church and to establish the Church of England. Catholics were not permitted to practise their faith openly or even in private; if they were caught, the consequences were severe: heavy fines, imprisonment, even death.

So, Catholics devised a "coded" carol as an instruction tool for their children. It was called the "Twelve Days of Christmas" and its images covered the essentials of their Catholic faith. The "True love" is God; the "me" is every baptised person; the "partridge in a pear tree" is Jesus and his cross; the "two turtle doves" are the New and Old Testaments"; the "three French hens" are faith, hope and charity; the "four birds" are the four Gospels; the "five golden rings" are the Pentateuch which were the first five books of the Hebrew Scripture that

contained the "law" or teaching and instructions; the "six geese-a-laying" are the six days of creation; the "seven swans" the Gifts of the Holy Spirit; the "eight maids" the Beatitudes; the "nine ladies dancing" the fruits of the Holy Spirit; the "ten Lords" the ten commandments; the "eleven pipers" the eleven faithful Apostles; the "twelve drummers" the twelve articles of faith in the Apostles Creed.

This year children in Reception and their Year 6 buddies, shared the story of the first Christmas in their own unique manner. The Mini Vinnies Committee prepared the 'Giving Tree' and collection of food items for St Vincent DePaul's Christmas hampers as well as the money raised from our Christmas dress up day. A big thank you for your generous support as this will allow a child or family to also share in the joy of Christmas Day.

This time of the year also brings sadness as we say farewell to friends and colleagues who are moving onto new pastures. Some we have known for many years and others but a short time. Our Year six and nine students are possibly feeling several conflicting emotions; happiness at graduating from Year 6 & 9, anxiety about what it could be like at Middle / Secondary School and sadness at moving away from some friends. We thank and farewell colleagues who are moving to other adventure. I hope and pray they all take away fond memories of their time at St Joseph's and that they will remember that God will always be there for them and to let the wonder of God's love come through their lives and allow it to be available to other people.

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THE HON PETER MALINAUSKAS MP

Dear parent/caregiver

Today, the Federal Parliament passed laws to implement 16 years as the minimum age for access to social media.

This globally-leading reform was initiated here in South Australia.

The State Government was determined to see reform in this area amid mounting concern and recognition from experts, clinicians, educators, parents and caregivers of the negative impacts of social media use on children's mental health, wellbeing and development.

Following substantial engagement with these stakeholders, it became clear to us that, on balance, a national minimum age for access to social media, is the right thing to do.

That's why here in South Australia, we commissioned former Chief Justice of the High Court, the Hon. Robert French AC, to conduct an independent legal examination into enforcing a minimum age limit for social media access.

His report outlined a path forward to legislate; however, our preference was always for a nationally consistent law, which is why I raised the matter at National Cabinet.

Now, through the work we started here in South Australia, our nation will be a global leader in keeping our next generation safe from the harms of social media.

When we see products doing children harm, whether it be drugs, cigarettes or alcohol, governments have a role to play. The addictive nature of social media is no different.

The national laws will commence following a 12-month implementation period and will establish a minimum age for platforms like Facebook, Snapchat, TikTok and Instagram. They will place the onus on social media platforms – not parents or young people – to take reasonable steps to keep kids under 16 years of age off their platforms.

In 2019, we announced that in Government, we would pursue a full mobile phone ban for students in South Australian Government schools. We've seen strong and positive outcomes from this pursuit and now every other state has implemented a similar ban.

From next year, all students in state government and Catholic schools will be taught about online safety and the dangers of social media through a strengthened curriculum, providing the tools to navigate the online world confidently and safely.

The new social media laws are another step in ensuring our kids live healthy, active lives – and that smartphones and social media are not the defining feature of their childhood.

We are proud that South Australia has led the way on this important reform that will ensure our children and young people are protected and well-equipped for the world they are growing up in.
